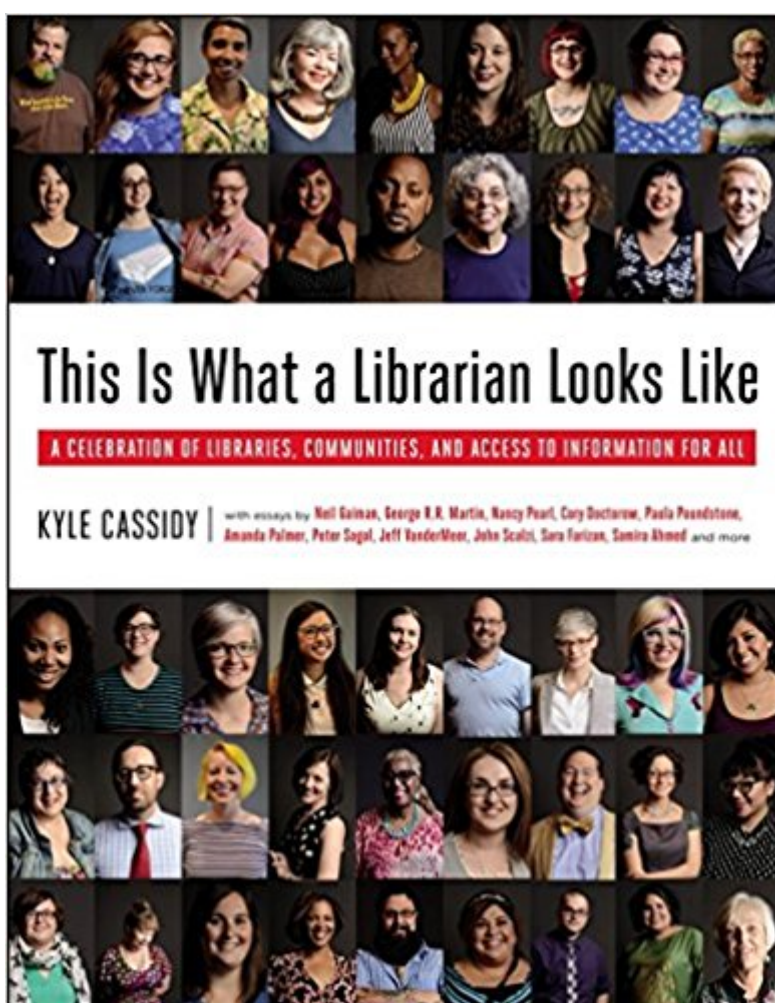

Cassidy also profiles a handful of especially influential librarians and libraries.
